



Chairman's Introduction

Much was achieved by the Charity in 2019. We have successfully merged with our former operational arm, Scottish Veterans' Housing Association to become a single charitable housing association; we have researched, consulted and published our strategy; and we have adopted a governance structure that is already demonstrating it provides for greater assurance, and allows the Governing Body better insights into the health and functioning of the Charity.



We remain a Registered Social Landlord and continue to provide supported and general housing in Broughty Ferry, Edinburgh and Glasgow.

One of the key benefits and reasons that was identified for the merger, was the greater organisational and financial resilience it would bring. In these wholly exceptional times, so this has proven to be. Despite the many challenges associated with the coronavirus pandemic, I am confident that Scottish Veterans' Residences will weather the storm and continue to support our Tenants and Residents with high quality service delivery.

Delivering and maintaining our services does not happen automatically. It is due to the dedication, innovation and commitment of our staff, who continue to go 'the extra mile' on behalf of

those the Charity supports. On behalf of the Governing Body, I want publicly to recognise and congratulate them for their effort and endeavour, throughout the previous year.

This report confirms that Scottish Veterans' Residences is in a very strong position structurally, organisationally and financially to be able to respond positively to the challenges it will face, particularly in the short term, but also in the mid and longer terms. I am confident we will emerge from the current public health crisis able to continue to play a strong and supportive role within the social housing and Veterans' sectors.

Chief Executive's Report

This report is primarily concerned with our operations during our financial year which ended on 31 December 2019. It is being compiled however while the Covid-19 virus is still having a significant impact and it would be remiss not to mention the effect of pandemic on Scottish Veterans' Residences (SVR).



I am hugely encouraged to report that the response of our Veterans and Staff has been extremely positive. Our Residents have accepted the restrictions and new routines with good humour and resilience. Our staff have shown flexibility and great ingenuity to keep all our services operating in a safe and effective manner. I am particularly pleased that, as of June 2020, none of our Veterans have become ill with Covid-19.

2019 was a very significant year for the Charity: SVR and Scottish Veterans' Housing Association merged to become a single Charity under the name Scottish Veterans' Residences and it was the first year that the Governing Body was required to submit an Annual Assurance Statement, (AAS) in addition to its Annual Report on the Scottish Social Housing Charter, to the SHR. The Governing Body submitted the AAS as required by 31 October 2019. This confirmed compliance with caveats to the regulatory framework. The AAS was supported by an action plan setting out the actions required to achieve full compliance. The actions required are on track to be completed, which if the other areas remain compliant, will allow the Governing Body to submit an un-caveated AAS in 2020.

Following significant internal and external consultation, the Charity published its strategy. The strategy describes the Why, What and How of the support provided by the Charity. In its development, the period 2019 - 2050 was analysed as a truly generational review was

considered necessary. The activity required in support of the strategy has been divided into Near (2019 - 24); Medium (2025 - 34); and Long Terms (2035 - 50).

We were proud to be accredited as a Living Wage employer on 15 March 2019 and to be shortlisted in the 'Newcomer' category of the Scottish Living Wage Awards in November.

Major projects and capital improvements, such as the spectacular refurbishment of the Whitefoord House Dining Room (see more on Page 10), are only made possible with vital contributions from funders and I thank the organisations and Trusts who continue to provide such generous support. Equally importantly, the many diverse activities that make such a huge difference to the wellbeing of our Veterans are enabled by donations from groups and individuals. In particular, the enduring support we enjoy from military associations, branches of Legion Scotland and Legion Scotland Women's Sections is hugely appreciated.

The hard work and enthusiasm of those who run, dog walk, grow moustaches and open their gardens for SVR translates directly to a better quality of life for Veterans in real need. On behalf of our Veterans and Staff I thank all who have supported SVR this year.

Gordon's Story

Gordon joined the Royal Artillery in 1979 and left after 3 years, joining the Territorial Army in the Royal Corps of Transport (RCT) shortly afterwards. He was called up for the Falklands Conflict although did not travel to the South Atlantic. After 7 years with the RCT he then joined the Liverpool Scottish and his 10 years with them included tours of Bosnia and Kosovo. After amalgamation of this unit he moved into the Royal Logistics Corps, was called up for the Iraq war in 2003 and served in Iraq for nearly a year.

In 2013, after serving a total of 34 years, Gordon started having flashbacks and mental health problems which eventually led to the end of his marriage. He returned to his home city of Edinburgh, initially sofa surfing, then living in his van with his beloved dog Nala before moving into a homeless hostel. He didn't realise that his mental health had deteriorated and had long spells where he didn't contact his family as he didn't want to burden them. He had spent 14 months working for the Local Authority while homeless when his mental health reached a crisis point and his GP referred him for urgent treatment. Gordon hadn't seen the crisis coming and didn't understand what was happening with his mental health. He was referred to Whitefoord House in February 2019.

Gordon says that from the day he arrived at Whitefoord House: 'it was like a tree: branches offering help appearing from everywhere'. He has had support from organisations such as Veterans First Point and SAMH, SVR's own therapeutic counsellor and his keyworker, Donald. 'Donald has been second to none, I can't speak highly enough of the staff', he says. 'The monthly meetings are good, you can suggest things and they get changed. Kirsty (the Manager of Whitefoord House) really listens.' Gordon took part in the photography project and his picture (with Nala) is on the wall of the refurbished Dining Room: 'The new Dining Room is exceptional, bright, airy and a nice space to be in. The photo project was amazing, I was gobsmacked at the way the photos came out. The photographer (Teresa Geisler) was absolutely fantastic.

Gordon was allowed to keep Nala with him when he moved in and is clear that he would not have come to Whitefoord House without her. There was a long time when he didn't want to see anybody, but he had the other residents to lean on. 'If I'm down, they notice it straight away and ask if I am Ok. Living with other veterans was helpful, there's plenty of banter. There is a great brotherhood in here.'

Now he feels that he is ready to move, his relationships with his family have improved massively and he has just picked up the keys for his tenancy with Dunedin Canmore Housing Association in Edinburgh. He is on a 6 week access course to the building trade which is part of SAMH and Poppyscotland's Employ-Able programme and will gain a range of certificates. 'These are fantastic opportunities that I wouldn't have had if I hadn't come to SVR'.

He would advise other veterans in need to come to SVR: 'I've seen half a dozen people move on in their lives that have had the help to move on. I can't say what would have happened to me if I hadn't come to SVR. I don't think I would have survived in the homeless unit. Now I just want to move on in life'.





Daniel's Story

Daniel (58) moved in to the Bellrock Close housing support service in October 2019, in March 2020 he will take up a secure tenancy in SVR's independent flats which share the site of the residence at Bellrock Close.

Daniel served in the 1st Battalion, The King's Regiment for four and a half years, spending 3 of them in Osnabruck, Germany. He left the Army in 1986 and, he says, 'went down the wrong road a few times and been down on his luck' .His mental health had suffered, particularly following his second amputation which had caused him considerable trauma. He came to Bellrock Close having spent a year in a residential programme in Glasgow to address alcohol dependency. He was referred to SVR by SSAFA's Housing Advisor in Glasgow.

Daniel was impressed with the facilities at Bellrock Close and noted how clean and quiet it was. He was a little concerned at first that residents are allowed to have alcohol in their flats but was reassured when he saw that there was no behaviour that would put his recovery at risk. He was really pleased with his flat which was adapted for a wheelchair user and had all the basics he needed such as bedding and crockery. Over the past six months he has been making the flat nice and homely and buying things that he can take with him to his long term tenancy.

With the support of his keyworker Ann, Danny accessed medical and dental care and was able to get his medication stabilised. At first the staff accompanied him to appointments but as he has become more confident he now goes on his own. The staff have helped him to obtain all the benefits that he was entitled to and he is now able to afford a car which has really helped with his independence as he never thought that he

would drive a car again after losing his legs. He is full of praise for the staff at Bellrock Close: 'no one ever criticised or judged me', he says, 'any worries I have are addressed and my support worker will point me in the direction to sort things out for myself. It's like living with 10 Mums!'

Daniel is excited about moving into his own independent flat, he has a money management plan so he knows that he can afford it and he has been saving up for furniture. Feeling more confident and stable, Daniel has been rebuilding relationships with his family. His daughters have seen a huge change in him and his son has visited him for the first time in 18 years. He feels that he is getting some normality back into his family relationships. Daniel is thinking about taking up new activities such as curling and perhaps in due course moving back into employment. He would advise anyone to grab the chance to come to SVR with both hands: 'it's an amazing place, I wouldn't want anything in my life to be different. I thank the staff with all my heart. I have a new future and a new life without chaos'.



Refurbishment of Whitefoord House Dining Room

The Dining Room at Whitefoord House had not been refurbished since the year 2000 and was greatly in need of an upgrade. Thanks to the support of funders and the skill of interior designer Malcom Duffin, it has been transformed into a bright, modern and flexible space.

An important part of the project was to allow for the kitchen to be secured so that the Dining Room can be used as an additional social area outside of meal times. There is now a relaxing corner with a new television and comfortable sofa. The sleek new servery is more hygienic and can offer more

flexible dining options and the biggest hit has been the smart new bean-to-cup coffee machine. This project would not have been possible with the financial support of generous funders including: ABF The Soldiers' Charity, BlackRock, The Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund, Trinity House Charity, The MacRobert Trust, Poppyscotland and The Queensberry House Trust

The Dining Room was formally re opened on 12 December by The Right Honourable Frank Ross, Lord Provost of Edinburgh. The occasion was made extra special with the performance of Christmas music by a cappela group Bel Canto and we were delighted to welcome serving Armed Forces personnel, the Scottish Veterans Commissioner and elected representatives to Whitefoord House for the event.

The activities include hillwalking, canoeing, climbing, canyoning and winter sports when the conditions are suitable. The feedback from the course is always positive and it is really encouraging to see the difference it makes to the well being and self-esteem Residents who have been to Gulabin.

Review of Operations

Occupancy Levels

Our 45 Scottish Secure Tenancies have remained almost continuously occupied throughout the year. When vacancies have occurred, there have been multiple applications. Tenancy turnover remains low with only 1 or 2 properties becoming vacant annually. This reflects the excellent value for money of our tenancies and the reactive and planned maintenance provided, which continues to exceed the standards set by the Scottish Housing Regulator. We had planned to commence refurbishment of tenancy bathrooms and kitchens during 2020 and made provision in the budget to do so, however with Covid-19 restrictions in place, it is likely this work will be delayed.

Occupancy of the Residences was more changeable, with void levels slightly higher than the 10% budgetary and sector appropriate target, during several months. This was counterbalanced by some particularly high occupancy levels at other times. Overall, we provided housing support services for 240 Veterans during 2019, the same number as 2018. Our Voids & Allocations Officers have contact with around 700 different individuals and agencies on a weekly basis to make them aware of the vacancies and services offered by the Charity. Additionally, the Chief Executive visited a number of Local Authority Armed Forces and Veterans Champions and associated housing staff, to brief them on the Charity and the services available. We have continued to receive referrals and contacts as a Referral Partner of the Veterans Gateway.

Property Development and Maintenance

The fire alarm systems at Rosendael and Whitefoord House were upgraded, partially funded through the generosity of the Queen Mary's Roehampton Trust. Both Residences also had their warden call systems modernised, significantly improving communication between Residents and support staff. A number of general maintenance projects were undertaken at Rosendael as part of House in Multiple Occupancy licencing.

Quality

Our Residences continue to provide high quality support. Whitefoord House and Rosendael are each graded by the Care Inspectorate as VERY GOOD in 3 areas and GOOD in 2 areas. Bellrock Close also received a VERY GOOD Grade and 2 GOOD Grades. We have recognised that since our last inspections, Health and Social Care standards have been updated and operate within a new quality framework to support the Care Inspectorate's scrutiny of regulated services.

Governing Body Members

The Governing Body recognises that four of its Members have served for over 9 years. It is content with this. All four Members wish to remain actively supporting the Charity; all fulfil their roles voluntarily with none being remunerated as Members of the Governing Body; all have competencies and experience that the Charity finds extremely useful and could not easily be replaced; and all four continue to add significant value through their membership.

Reserves

The Members of the Governing Body have reviewed the reserves of the Charity. Reserves will continue to be invested within a risk spectrum recommended by the Investment, Remuneration and Finance Committee and agreed by the Governing Body. The review examined the nature of income and expenditure streams and the need to ensure the availability of reserves to meet future demands. The Governing Body concluded that the level of reserves is appropriate to support the current level of work undertaken by the organisation and that it should retain sufficient financial reserve for a twelve-month period, in the event of a catastrophic reduction in funding. To this end it has set aside:

- £5m as a contingency should significant structural repairs or maintenance be required to our aged listed buildings of Rosendael and Whitefoord House, or for a significant increase in demand to accommodate Veterans;
- \geq £1.7m to provide 12 months staff salaries; and

In addition, the Governing Body has authorised the creation of a special purpose reserve to mitigate the potential costs of reducing the organisation's carbon emissions and establishing a more sustainable footprint in line with expected legislation/regulation.

Key Performance Indicators*


The Association reports on its performance against a series of indicators defined in the Scottish Social Housing Charter. Despite a busy year in terms of activity the Charity continued to perform well. This was the first year that we employed a provider to undertake face to face interviews with our Residents and Tenants, rather than distribute questionnaires for completion. This has resulted in a significant increase in responses, rising from 40.7% in the previous year to 70% in this year's survey.


The percentage of residents and tenants satisfied with the overall service is 80.9% and 75.6% for value for money. These results are a slight reduction on the previous year and this is partly due to residents transitioning more quickly through the services therefore not staying long enough to formulate any strong opinions. The Charity recognises the need to improve continually. As part of that process, each Residence holds quarterly meetings for Residents, chaired by a member of the Governing Body. The Chief Executive also meets with the Bellrock Close Tenants every 6 months, and at their request every 3 months with the Gilmerton and Whitefoord House Tenants, for open discussion to address their desire to be more informed and involved in the decision-making process.

91.18% of tenants were satisfied with the quality of their home. 100% of the Charity's general use properties meet the Scottish Housing Quality Standard and National Home Energy Rating/Standard Assessment Procedure. 98% meet or, in most instances, exceed the Energy Efficiency Standards for Social Housing, which is required to be met by 2020.
